

Live It 1 — Casual Has To Go

Take-Home Devotional • God Is Holy

WEEKLY GRATITUDE PROMPT

Gratitude slows us down and reawakens our wonder.

This week: Each day, thank God for one thing about Him that is simply beyond you — His holiness, His power, His mercy, His nearness. Don't rush past it. Let yourself be amazed again.

Write it down or say it out loud before bed.

GOAL FOR THE WEEK

Awe grows when we stop treating God as common.

This week's goal: Read Isaiah 6:1–8 once each day. Read it slowly, and each time ask one question: What does this show me about God? Let casual go and approach Him with wonder.

DEVOTIONAL THOUGHTS

Devotional 1 — Holy, Holy, Holy

Read This Verse: Isaiah 6:3

Around the throne the angels never cry love, love, love, or power, power, power. They cry holy, holy, holy. In Hebrew, repetition is emphasis, and only once in all of Scripture is an attribute of God said three times. Holiness is the word that defines all the others. His love is holy love. His mercy is holy mercy. There is no one like Him.

Reflection Prompt: When did God last leave you genuinely amazed, and what has crowded that wonder out lately?

Prayer Prompt: “God, restore my wonder. Don't let me treat You as common.”

Devotional 2 — When We See God, We See Ourselves

Read This Verse: Isaiah 6:5

When Isaiah finally sees God clearly, he stops comparing himself to everyone else and says, “Woe is me.” But the same holiness that exposes him is the holiness that heals him — an angel touches his lips with a coal from the altar. God does not reveal what is broken in us to shame us. He reveals it so He can heal it.

Reflection Prompt: Is there something God has been exposing that you have been hearing as shame instead of an invitation to be made whole?

Prayer Prompt: “God, show me myself in Your light, and then heal what You reveal.”

Devotional 3 — Awe Before Assignment

Read This Verse: Isaiah 6:8

Only after Isaiah has seen God does God ask, “Who will go for us?” And only then does Isaiah answer, “Here am I. Send me.” Notice the order: awe came before assignment, presence before purpose. We were never meant to merely work for God. We were made to be amazed by Him, and to serve out of that wonder.

Reflection Prompt: Where are you tempted to rush to the assignment without first spending time in His presence?

Prayer Prompt: “God, let me see You first. Send me from a place of awe, not just activity.”
